Tuition Task Force Update

The NSC Tuition Task Force, comprised of board members and college an system representatives met in Kearney in August to study and review the issues connected with setting tuition rates. Some of the issues discussed included the overall goal of the task force, as well as forces that affect tuition rates and current policies and statutes.

ACTION: Approve Molecular Biology Option in Comprehensive Major in Biology at Chadron State College

Chadron State College presently offers a Comprehensive Major in Biology consisting of 57 credit hours within its Bachelor of Science degree. This program requires a student to complete a core of common courses in life sciences before completing one of the following options in Environmental Studies, General Biology, and Human Biology. The discipline of Biology has three primary areas of emphasis: human biology, environmental (field) biology, and the recently emerged molecular (laboratory) biology. This request proposes a complete undergraduate experience be offered within the life science discipline. By adding the Molecular Biology option, one new course will be required. The addition of this option will require no new resources such as additional faculty or equipment.

ACTION: Approve Proposed Changes to Board Policy 9015 Food Service Operations; Contracts; Vendors

The NSCS is in the process of putting together bid specifications to seek competitive proposals for food service vendors for the next few years. All of the colleges are now on the same schedule, and advertising will be done jointly. The colleges anticipate that proposals may be received from companies that want to serve just one or two of our schools or perhaps all three. The specifications will be written so as not to preclude single-school proposals but also such that a system-wide proposal could be considered as well.

The specifications are complex and require a great deal of time and effort to prepare. Once a vendor is selected, the colleges feel it would be to their advantage, and to the advantage of the vendors selected, to be able to keep the same company for seven years instead of five years, as current policy indicates. Oftentimes vendors are willing to make improvements to the kitchen or dining facilities, for which they like to be able to spread financing over several years. The contracts will continue to require annual renewals to be submitted for Board approval, and the contracts will allow for an opt out provision if service is not satisfactory.

The system office and the colleges recommend first round approval of a change to Policy 9015 that allows the change from a five-year contract to a seven-year contract.

BOARD POLICY

Objectives of the college food service are to 1) serve high quality foods at reasonable prices and at convenient times; 2) provide vending machine services at hours the food kitchens are closed; 3) provide catering to college groups and others in the college interest; 4) and provide a teaching resource for training students in foods and food service activities.

Food services of the colleges are to operate within said intent and shall be provided so as to avoid competing with local commercial eating establishments.

Should a college choose to provide food service through contract with a food service vendor, such contract is to be approved by the Board upon recommendation by the College President.

Proposals are Each college is to be solicited proposals from food service vendors every seven five years. A copy of the proposed contract is to be submitted to the System Office for review prior to submitting it to the Board for approval. When approval has been granted by the Board, at least three (3) copies of the primary contract will be signed by the vendor, the College President (or his/her designee) and then submitted to the System Office for the Executive Director's signature. Annual renewals of the contract, as recommended by the College President, are to be submitted to the Board for approval. Annual renewal agreements will also be signed by the vendor, the College President (or his/her designee) and submitted to the System Office for the Executive Director's signature, upon approval by the Board of Trustees.

ACTION: Approve Use of LB 1100 Funds as Requested by Each of the State Colleges

Legislation was passed in 1999 establishing the practice of setting aside a depreciation allowance on recently completed new construction and larger renovation projects. The purpose was to allow the build-up of a fund that could help address necessary major renewal or renovation projects. The legislation has been amended several times during the budget cutting years, both to limit or eliminate the amount of the pay-in for specific years and to expand the purposes for which the depreciation funds could be used.

At its June meeting, the Board approved the use of the first small amount from our depreciation fund for an emergency project at Chadron State College, \$14,750 used to match an LB 309 allocation to replace the roof on the Nelson Physical Activity Center. Prior to December 1, 2004, the NSCS needs to submit a complete plan for the use of the amount authorized by statute.

In a thorough analysis of the various amendments to the statute, it appears that the NSCS could have requested use of some of the funds in 2003-04, an amount of \$294,492 plus interest earnings of \$22,165.60, for a total of \$316,657.60. For 2004-05, the amount we are eligible to access is half that amount or \$158,328.80. The system office and the colleges recommend submission of a request to the 309 Task Force that would include both this year's amount and last year's amount, or a total of \$474,986.40. The funds, to be distributed based on the amounts contributed by each college, would be used as follows:

<u>Chadron State College - \$210,432 less \$14,750 already allocated, or \$195,682</u> – CSC proposes to utilize its allocation for partial and/or whole funding of projects included in its 2005-07 LB 309 budget request, including fire and life safety, deferred repair, energy conservation, and ADA.

<u>Peru State College - \$74,432.40</u> – PSC would use its funding as one of the sources of funds to complete interior remodeling of Administration Building. (Other sources of funds for the project, estimated at approximately \$550,000 in addition to the \$690,000 LB309 HVAC renovation, include campus funds, Foundation Funds, and Capital Improvement fees.) If any LB 1100 depreciation funds remain after completion of the Administration Building remodel, PSC proposes to use them to address funding of projects included in its 2005-07 LB 309 budget request.

<u>Wayne State College - \$190,122</u> – WSC would use LB 1100 depreciation funds for making improvements to the basement of U.S. Conn Library, to provide offices and workspace for Network and Technology Services. A second use of the funds would be improvements to the water distribution system, such as water main, fire hydrants, shutoff valves, and backflow prevention. If any depreciation funds remain after completion of these projects, they would be used to address funding of projects included in the 2005-07 LB 309 budget request.

ACTION: Accept the 2003-2004 Revenue Bond Audit Reports as submitted for the State Colleges by KPMG

KPMG was engaged to perform the audit for the revenue bond programs at the colleges for fiscal year 2003-04. The 2002 Master Resolution calls for an annual audit of the records of the revenue bond program to show revenues, fees, and earnings credit to the program, the financial condition at the close of the fiscal year, transactions during the year, a review of the insurance carried on the facilities and other buildings, the percentage of occupancy and use of the facilities, and any other matters deemed relevant and necessary by the Accountant to make the audit informative. This year, for the first time, the audit is a system report. Information for each of the colleges is provided, along with system summaries that make comparison between the colleges easy. The audit incorporates information on both the 2002 refunding and supplemental issues and the 2003 supplemental issues.

The revenue bond programs are all solid. Although the Master Resolution only requires debt service coverage of 110% for each of the colleges, Board policy # 9005 requires that CSC and WSC maintain a minimum 125% debt service coverage and PSC a 135% debt service coverage ratio, a policy that helps make our bonds attractive in the market. The ratios for the years covered by the audit are shown below. In keeping with the provisions of the Master Resolution, expenditures for capital improvements and extraordinary repairs that were charged to surplus and construction funds are not deducted in arriving at amounts available for debt service coverage.

KPMG indicates that the financial statements present fairly the revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances as required by our bond agreement. The management letter indicates that the auditors found no issues of concern that needed to be reported in the course of the audit.

Brand Identity Campaign Initiatives

1. System Logo

Two estimates have been received and we are in the process of negotiating this, along with a style guide that articulates the proper usage of the new logo, color scheme and tagline.

2. Visual Representation of System

This will include a compelling media design to use for 1-2 years for all system advertising, website, publications, etc. Two estimates have been received and we are again negotiating.

3. System Website

The information architecture needs to be entirely reconstructed and a more compelling, updated design needs to be added. Four estimates have been received.

4. DVD/CD

A draft RFP will be reviewed in the Enrollment and Marketing Committee meeting. The overall project timeline includes having the script completed this winter. The company selected will spend two-days at each college in the spring shooting footage and still photography. Editing will occur immediately afterward, so the four DVD/CD set can be introduced in the summer and fall of 2005.

5. Traveling Show

The plan is to hold this traveling show for guidance counselors, students and parents in five towns in Nebraska during September 2005. The Enrollment and Marketing Committee and Council of Admissions and College Relations Officers will discuss which towns and dates, as well as possible sponsorships for food and beverages. More information will be provided during the next meeting.

6. Nebraska State College System Month

We would like the Governor to declare October 2005 as NSCS Month. Bill Roskens has been working on this effort.

7. Counseling Excellence Award

The committee and council want to award one counselor with a Counseling Excellence Award plaque at a dinner in April/May each year to thank them for their assistance to students throughout the year. The committee and council will develop an overall plan for the nomination process and funding and present it to the board at a later date.

8. System Brochure

We are completely out of stock of the former system brochure. Carnegie recommended a more elaborate and expanded publication in the brand identity campaign, so the committee and council will discuss what should be included in the redesign.

Other Efforts

Other efforts may arise during these meetings and will be provided as informational items as they develop.

- Developed a new system online course guide to include all offerings at Chadron, Peru and Wayne State Colleges.

Executive Director Report – October 4 2004

- 1. The Nebraska State College System Tuition Task Force met immediately after the Board meeting at Chadron. Discussion centered around out-of-state tuition rates and what impact the NSCS current rate of twice the in-state tuition rate has had on out-of-state enrollments. The task force will meet for a third time following the Board meeting at WSC. If all goes as planned, the group will make a recommendation regarding out-of-state tuition for review by the Council of Presidents and ultimately for action by the Board of Trustees.
- 2. As of this writing, we have received more than forty (40) applications from candidates interested in the CSC presidency. The search/recommendation and the search/recommendation advisory committees will meet on Monday, October 25 for a third time. At this meeting the committees will carefully review the applications and reduce the number of candidates who remain in the pool. We will then ask those remaining to submit additional information for the committees' further consideration. Plans call for the committees to conduct airport interviews in Omaha and for the full Board to interview the finalists in Scottsbluff on January 27.
- 3. After the Board meeting at Chadron, system office staff and college staff began discussing the next steps in our enrollment-marketing efforts. We will soon put out RFP's regarding the DVD/advertising promotion pieces. Additionally we are seeking proposals for a new logo design and the system visual identification piece. Some other steps taken on the marketing front recently include:
 - The NSC had a substantial presence at the recent statewide K-12 counselors meeting in Lincoln. College representatives presented sessions, staffed the NSCS exhibit and provided breakfast and snacks.
 - 2) The NSCS will have a prominent advertisement on the back page of the *Omaha World Herald* College Bound special section on Sunday, October 17. This edition is expected to reach nearly 600,000 adults in Nebraska and Iowa.
 - 3) The newly published and greatly expanded NSCS Newsletter will be received by a larger target audience. We plan to e-mail all employees a link to an online version of the newsletter and also send hard copies for employees without email addresses. Other target markets include legislators, guidance counselors, media, librarians, and other college and university presidents.
 - 4) The colleges plan to share their individual marketing plans created by Carnegie Communications with college employees during the week of October 18-22. The system marketing plan will be introduced once the logo, visual representation and other efforts are underway.
- 4. Once again we are printing a listing of all NSCS courses that are offered on-line. These will be distributed to legislators, the CCPE and others. The listing will also be available on-line for interested parties. In addition, each college will each include the other colleges' on-line course offerings in their spring schedules which reflects our commitment to providing choices for our students.
- 5. Enrollment across the system remains solid. Both Peru and Wayne report increases and Chadron is holding its own. Peru reports the largest entering class in history. Wayne has a solid increase in graduate students and Chadron's freshman class in up over 10% from last year.

6. The final budget documents were submitted in a timely fashion and the Coordinating Commission has issued its recommendations. The NSCS fared well in the CCPE review. In the ranking of capital projects across higher education, the Chadron Administration Building/Sparks Hall project tied for third place with a UNO project, behind only LB 309 Fire and Life Safety and Deferred Repair Class I projects. Peru's emergency power generator is ranked next, and after Class II and III Fire and Life Safety projects, is Peru's Al Wheeler Renovation/Addition design. The Wayne projects and the PSC bleachers rank a little farther down the list. Rick Collings spoke at the CCPE meeting on Wednesday, October 13, in support of the Carhart Science Building renovation, and the Commission subsequently gave its approval to the project. In its general overview, the CCPE noted concern for the lower level of funding per FTE student at WSC as compared to its peers.

CHADRON STATE COLLEGE - President's Report – October 2004

Downloading and Copyright

Introduction

Two important issues facing higher education campuses in recent years are Internet downloading and copyright violations. While downloading of music, video, and data is widely accepted by the public as an alternative medium of entertainment, it has imposed heavy demands on bandwidth, related network devices, and technology staff responsible for maintaining an acceptable level of customer service. In addition, downloading has created legal exposure for institutions, personnel, and students. Students entering an institution often have the expectation that computing services will be comparable to those provided by an Internet Service Provider (ISP) when, in fact, the institution does not possess the technological and funding resources to do so. Educational networks exist with a more limited purpose (i.e., academically related) and do not provide the full range of services provided by an ISP. The freedom to download carries with it the responsibility for following copyright law. As a result, to provide adequate protections related to network security and copyright, institutions are required to establish clear policies and make those available to users.

Chadron State College is no stranger to issues associated with Internet downloading and copyright. In October 2001, a report was submitted to the CSC Student Senate President regarding bandwidth utilization, file sharing, and potential solutions. That report was the result of a frustrated technology staff and student body whose file sharing activity was imposing a negative effect on network response time. Recently, the Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA) become aggressive in taking legal action against individuals, especially college students, for downloading and sharing copyrighted music. Although to our knowledge no CSC student has been the subject of RIAA legal action, numerous RIAA notices have been received by CSC. Institutional response to RIAA notices that have been verified has been termination of network connectivity to residence hall students and employees. Another related and emerging issue involves the implementation of video streaming technology. The actions of Newport Beach, California-based Acacia Media Technologies Corp. have stalled video streaming implementation because of Acacia's claim that the use of streaming video in areas such as distance learning and video lectures violates patents held by that entity.

CSC's Bandwidth Capacity

A history of CSC bandwidth capacity is attached; the attachment demonstrates the ever-increasing demand for bandwidth. In fact, each increase in bandwidth has been in response to inadequate response time, which has typically been triggered by disruptive technologies (e.g., downloading, file sharing).

Currently, two T1 lines are allocated to CSC residence halls and two T1 lines to the remaining campus buildings. A fifth T1 line is dedicated to a private distance learning network involving school districts in the ESU 13 region. It is estimated that the residence halls will require an additional T1 line within the next 18 months. Two T1 lines should serve the remaining campus buildings for at least 24 months. However, emerging technologies, such as wireless connectivity, could have a significant impact as mobile computing will affect the location and frequency of connections. Video streaming will likewise affect the network and associated bandwidth utilization. Of course, meeting these demands will require the commitment of additional resources.

CSC Actions

In response to emerging technologies, the need to meet student and personnel demands, legal considerations, and resources implications, Chadron State College has taken a number of actions. Among those are the following:

Network Devices...

In November of 2002, Computer Services installed a Packeteer PacketShaper to assist with management of bandwidth utilization within the residence halls. This device allocates a certain amount of bandwidth that can be utilized for downloads. However in recent years this device has become less effective in managing bandwidth as programs have been developed to bypass such detection by disguising themselves as normal web surfing. The most useful feature of the PacketShaper during the Fall 2004 term is to identify those individuals who are using the most bandwidth. These individuals are contacted and advised to curtail use.

Virus Control...

Bandwidth consumption is also greatly affected by the proliferation of viruses that produce undesired network traffic and create bottlenecks most often on the main campus router. When infected with a virus, the central processing unit (CPU) of the router becomes so taxed that it will not allow traffic into or out of the network. This halts all Web and e-mail traffic to and from the campus.

Effective the summer of 2004, CSC Computer Services created a Responsible Network Use Policy requiring all residence hall students to take responsibility for their computers and their use of the campus network. Prior to connecting to the campus network, students are required to provide an updated operating system, anti-virus and anti-spyware software, and to self-certify that their computers are scanned and virus free. Students are also required to keep their computers virus free and to disable file serving. Non-compliance may result in revocation of connection to the campus network.

Education...

Networks in elementary and secondary schools tend to be very secure and controlled. As a result, students at those grade levels often do not have to address issues of responsible use of networks. Typically, then, responsible use becomes a home and family issue. Unless the student is instructed in responsible network use in the home environment, he or she is not taught the importance of such use. When students arrive on campus they are often unfamiliar with the need to keep operating systems and anti-virus software current, to scan their computers often for viruses and spyware, to turn off file serving, and to download only non-copyrighted material from the Internet.

CSC Computer Services attempts to educate students on responsible use by distributing relevant information via direct e-mail messages, article placement in the Eagle newspaper, distribution of pamphlets, communication with student government, and residence hall meetings. Regardless, much staff time and effort is expended managing student connections to the campus network.

Since CSC Computer Services does not have staffing available, students who are identified with infected computers are directed to local businesses for system updates and cleaning. This incurs a cost to the student and is often the best motivation for educating students about responsible network use.

Copyright Issues

All institutions of higher education are required to provide written evidence of intent to comply with copyright laws and regulations. Such written policies provide some degree of liability protections when institutional computer systems or networks carry materials that violate (infringe) copyright law. Effective August of 2003, CSC formalized a, "Copyright Policy," published it on the CSC web site, and notified the campus community of the Policy. The Policy references federal copyright law, fair use, the Digital Millennium Copyright Act, and the Technology Education And Copyright Harmonization Act. Also included in the CSC Policy is a, "Notice and Takedown Procedure," that outlines how CSC will respond to possible infringement. The Policy and Procedure appear to be effective; to date, CSC has had no subpoena action associated with copyright infringement.

EduCAUSE, a national consortium of higher education institutions that promotes intelligent use of information technology, has published on its web site, "A Report to the Subcommittee on Courts, the Internet, and Intellectual Property." The Report was developed by the Joint Committee of the Higher Education and Entertainment Communities, with membership and representation from both the postsecondary education sector and the entertainment industry. The Report indicates that the ways in which college and universities are addressing the copyright issue in regard to music and video downloading varies. As many as 20 universities have signed subscription agreements with companies such as Napster, Apple, Ruckus, MusicRebellion, and Ctrax to offer legitimate entertainment content to students. The trend toward such subscription agreements is expected to continue and become as widespread as access to cable TV. The Report indicates that institutions are updating acceptable use policies to reflect current issues, developing on-line courses on popular culture that provide direct links to on-line recordings instead of requiring students to visit music libraries, and allocating defined amounts of bandwidth to students that cannot be exceeded.

Acacia Media Technologies, Corp. has launched an attack on higher education following unsuccessful claims against adult web sites who use streaming technology. Higher education is being asked to pay license fees (\$5,000 minimum) to Acacia for streaming video technology, which is often used for distance education, video lectures, and any form of electronic audio and video file transmission. The American Council on Education is advising institutions to not pay the requested fee. This patent matter was brought to the attention of CSC in March of 2004. CSC's concern about potential Acacia claims relate to the institution's use of Blackboard and the experimentation with a product called Helix, both of which are used for distance learning purposes. License documents for Blackboard and Helix have been collected by the CSC Senior Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs. NSCS legal counsel has been contacted for an opinion and advice. Based upon the advice of legal counsel, CSC will continue to use existing systems until further notified.

Conclusion

CSC continues efforts to provide appropriate levels of bandwidth, monitor bandwidth utilization, manage student and employee network use, ensure compliance with legal requirements, and make effective and efficient use of available resources. The rapidly changing nature of the technologies involved, the expectations and sophistication of skill among users, a shifting legal environment that at times conflicts with traditional values of academic freedom, and increasingly scarce resources present an ongoing challenge to institutions to provide responsive and secure network access. Emphasis at Chadron State College has been placed on educating students and personnel about the various issues, policies, and procedures related to this challenge. Those efforts appear to be effective and will continue.

Peru State College Campus Technology: It's Just Not That Simple Anymore

Technology needs of the Peru State College campus have grown exponentially in the last decade. Eight years ago PSC had about 10 networked desktop PC's and today that number is more than 200. The capacity of the network has also grown with more network devices and wireless technology. Unfortunately, during this same time the number of positions in the Computer Services (CS) Department was reduced by 2 because of budget cuts.

These technological changes have made it easier for faculty, staff, and students to work and collaborate both on and off campus. We have become dependent on networked computers to connect with our Student Information System, Financial Records System, process payroll, e-mail, Library Automation, and research. The PSC CS Department must continually find increasingly efficient ways to provide "individual" support, improve communication and collaboration, maintain network security and maintain reasonable speed, bandwidth and response times for the faculty, staff and students.

Providing this "individual" support is complicated by the constantly growing and changing array of viruses, spy ware and internet traffic intentionally designed to disrupt networks or use them surreptitiously. Most network problems result from unintentional introduction of a virus-related problem to the network. The daunting task of protecting the campus from such things and of repairing the damage when things happen falls to the CS Department.

Initially, as the number of computers grew and our network expanded we relied upon the OEM version of virus software preinstalled on the computers we ordered. As the numbers increased, a multiple user license of McAfee virus protection was purchased to provide consistency and meet the needs of computers that came without virus protection. Virus software must be continually updated with files that contain the ability to detect the latest viruses as they are discovered. These updates at times come out 2-3 times a week, but most generally at least once a week. Computer Services would download the updated DAT file and put it on a "network share," then send an e-mail to all users on campus to have them go to the "share" and execute the program on their individual computers. Unfortunately, there was little success in this process as not all faculty and staff users always followed the directions. Consequently viruses were always spreading and seriously impacting the network. We were forced to combat virus infections on individual computers, one by one at a huge cost of time and manpower.

With this increasingly huge growth in virus activity on the Internet and our rising need to protect individual computers and the network, the Administration invested in McAfee Active Virus Defense (AVD). In the summer of 2002 an ePolicy Orchestrator (EPO) server was installed on the network. The server now provides a central point of virus software management of campus settings, updating DAT files, scans for viruses and installs software upgrades for all individual computer virus detection products on all college servers and office computers. To do this, we had to install new software on all campus computers. With no other reliable method, Computer Services staff started on a quest to install the software that communicated with the EPO server and virus detection software by physically going out to every computer on campus and installing the new software. The new centrally-controlled virus detection/elimination software has proved effective. As of the fall of 2004 there have been over 11,000 virus occurrences in the year since the server went online. However, viruses still continue to be a problem because students and faculty occasionally bring unmonitored software or files from home and install it without authorization, thus transferring the virus to the campus network from inside our "firewall."

The last couple of years have seen an exponential increase in the number of new viruses. Currently, 300 to 600 new viruses appear each month, which correlates to 10 or 20 new viruses per day. These new viruses are becoming increasingly sophisticated in the way they spread to and infect machines. Viruses now exist which infect diskettes, program files, Word documents, Excel spreadsheets, Java applications, Access databases, batch scripts, and more. At the same time, the Internet's evergrowing popularity and the steady adoption of "always on" broadband technologies has allowed viruses to spread quickly.

This ongoing virus outbreak has forced us into the next step of our technology plans. It is essential that campus CS technical staff attend training regularly to keep their skills current and to learn about the newest and most efficient ways to administer campus technology. One of the most promising new tools that has been implemented recently to facilitate network computing is the Active Directory Structure which PSC now employs.

What is Active Directory?

- A centralized place to store information that otherwise might be scattered throughout a campus.
- A central authority for network security, readily verifying a user's identity and controlling his or her access to the resources managed by the directory service.
- A means to consolidate management tasks.
- A source for approved computer applications and solutions that allow budget, human resource
 and administrative personnel, as well as college recruiters, registrars, and financial aid officers, to
 do their jobs in new, faster and more effective way.
- A way to enable managers to manage campus networks more effectively and at lower cost.
- A means to enable better network security while reducing total cost of doing so.
- A source for bringing solutions to all campus computers more quickly and at lower cost.
- A way for students and faculty to have greater access to authorized software resources from any location on campus or off campus.
- A means for academic users to easily share information with colleagues, adjunct faculty, remote campuses, suppliers and others through a virtual private network (VPN) or extranet.
- A pool of information used by diverse applications such as marketing, recruiting, registration, financial aid and alumni in a single place. This makes it much more efficient to build interconnected systems while also increasing the accuracy and speed of information transfer.
- A means to significantly lower CS management costs by providing a single place to manage users, groups and network resources, as well as distribute software and manage desktop configurations.
- A single-point of management for Windows user accounts, clients, servers, and applications as well as the ability to synchronize with existing directories.
- A way to automatically distribute software to users based on their role in the institution, reducing
 or eliminating multiple trips that system administrators need to make for software installation and
 configuration.

• A way to allow CS to automatically distribute software to users based on their role in the organization. For example, a college could specify that all users in the financial aid office have the aid-qualification application available to them regardless of where they log on to the network.

For example, Active Directory users can directly query the directory for network resources such as printers. Since the directory can store attributes about objects, it can store the location and the capabilities of an institution's printers and expose these attributes as search criteria so the user can search for "printers in Hoyt Science that print color" directly from the "Start" menu in Windows. What's more, the directory can refer the desktop operating system to all the configuration information it needs to set up a new printer so when users find the printer they want, they can use it right away

Security and Authentication

Strong and consistent security services are essential to academic networks. Managing user authentication and access control is often tedious and prone to error. PSC administrators are making every attempt to define and control the state of computers and users on campus. For example, PSC can allow students to view the network, but not allow them to alter the contents of their local hard drives. The college prevents students, staff, and faculty from downloading undesirable software from the Internet or brought from home; from running unapproved software from elsewhere on the network and from changing the local configurations of campus computers. As a result, administrators save considerable time previously spent on restoring corrupted computer configurations.

For example, the IT administrators can limit a student worker's administrative authority to the student union or to modifying--but not deleting-- user accounts. This security can also be extended to limit visibility of information to certain groups for even further security. Active Directory offers the flexibility to provide multiple views depending on user security group.

Active Directory acts as the central authority for governing authentication of user identity and controlling access to network resources. It supports a number of authentication mechanisms used to prove identity upon logon to Windows 2000. Once a user is authenticated and logged on, all resources in the system are protected and access is granted or denied based on a single authorization model.

And the effort continues.

WAYNE STATE COLLEGE - President's Report October 2004

Over the past three years, the number of science majors at Wayne State College has grown by 38.5%, from 244 in Fall 2001 to 314 in Fall 2003. These numbers include all life sciences, chemistry, natural science, physical science and pre-professional majors. This significant increase is due in large part to several pre-professional programs offered at Wayne State College.

Rural Health Opportunities Program/Mid-America Rural Health Opportunities Program

Two programs of excellence at Wayne State College are the Rural Health Opportunities Program (RHOP) and the Mid-America Rural Health Opportunities Program (MARHOP). Both programs are designed to address the special needs of rural America by encouraging rural students to pursue a health career and then return to rural America. There simply are not enough health care providers in rural America, so why not encourage those mostly likely to return home to practice their professions?

Begun at Wayne State in 1990, RHOP is a cooperative program with the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC). RHOP is for rural Nebraskan students only, where "rural" is defined as everywhere except Lincoln and Omaha. Currently, RHOP provides career- track opportunities for students interested in becoming family physicians, dentists, dental hygienists, pharmacists, and medical technologists. Dr. Todd Young is the Wayne State RHOP/MARHOP coordinator.

Those accepted into the program are guaranteed admission to UNMC, contingent upon fulfilling a set of expectations while at WSC. Other benefits include: a Wayne State tuition waiver, depending on the career track; a specific curriculum for a given career track; exposure to health care settings and practices; and visits and contact with faculty, students, and alumni from UNMC. The expectations include maintaining a 3.5 grade point average; attending all required program events (presentations, meeting, trips, etc.); conducting themselves properly and professionally; and being a role model for other health care students.

Starting in 1995 at Wayne State, MARHOP is a cooperative with Creighton University. MARHOP is for rural students from Nebraska and the nearby states (Iowa, Wyoming, South Dakota, Colorado, Kansas, and Missouri). MARHOP offers career-track opportunities for students interested in pharmacy, occupational therapy, and physical therapy. The benefits and expectations are identical to RHOP, except that there are no tuition waivers available at this time for the program. Chadron State College is the only other college in the state to offer the RHOP and MARHOP programs.

Wayne State College RHOP and MARHOP students have excelled, both at Wayne State and in their professional studies following completion of coursework at Wayne State:

- For the upcoming graduating class in pharmacy at Creighton University Medical Center, three of the top nine students in the class of 57 are Wayne State College RHOP students.
- A Wayne State College RHOP student is currently in the top third of her class at the UNMC College of Dentistry.

• In 1993, Wayne State RHOP students were at the top of their graduating classes in pharmacy and medicine.

Currently, 64 students are enrolled in both RHOP and MARHOP (all years, all areas) at Wayne State, including 10 first-year students in MARHOP and 18 in RHOP. Looking back to 1999, the number enrolled in both programs was 43.

Lastly, something important to note is that both programs are "handshake" agreements, in that there is nothing truly committing a student to return to rural America except their "word." To date, the rural American "word" has been good, as over 95% of those students fully completing their career educations have returned to rural America. While this continues, so do the programs.

Applications are due by December 1 and February 1 prior to the next fall semester for RHOP and MARHOP, respectively.

BRIN/INBRE

Wayne State College will be awarded more than \$1,000,000 thanks to the Biomedical Research Infrastructure Network (BRIN, now known as INBRE--IDea Networks of Biomedical Research Excellence). The BRIN/INBRE grant provides funding for Wayne State sophomores and juniors to conduct biomedical research at the University of Nebraska Medical Center, Creighton University or the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

During the first three years of the BRIN grant, a total of \$401,355 was awarded to Wayne State College. The next cycle, of which we are in the first year, is for five years, with Wayne State being awarded \$122,769 per year. In all, the BRIN/INBRE grant will bring in a total of \$1,015,200 to benefit student and faculty research.

This grant is aimed at research geared toward making people healthier through biomedical research. Dr. Shawn Pearcy, associate professor and Dr. Doug Christensen, assistant professor, are associates in the BRIN/INBRE grant.

While the research may be focused on biomedics, the lab equipment is available to all faculty and students involved in all areas of science, including research in biomedicine. It is aimed at drug therapy, gene therapy and limb reattachment--all of which will make people's lives healthier."

In addition to funds for equipment, the grant also provides funding for three Wayne State students to attend one of three graduate universities for an eight-week summer program. Upon returning to WSC, students continue their research projects. Students who complete the BRIN program at Wayne State are guaranteed a position and stipend at BRIN-associated labs at the University of Nebraska Medical Center, Creighton University or the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Funding for the grant comes from the National Institutes of Health. The grant was written by Jim Turpen from UNMC. Turpen, the principal investigator for BRIN research in Nebraska, contacted Professors Pearcy and Christensen because of their training and education in biomedicine.

Since having the BRIN/INBRE grant, Wayne State students and faculty members have had the opportunity to give presentations at regional and national conferences. Since 2001, WSC chemistry faculty members and students have given a total of 24 presentations at regional/national meetings of the American Chemical Society and the Nebraska Academy of Science. In October 2004, Dr. Paul Karr, chemistry professor, co-authored on four presentations and three papers as a result of his sabbatical research and continuing research collaboration with Wichita State University faculty.

WSC graduates have also been successful in their post-collegiate careers. In just the past few years, WSC graduates have achieved the following:

- WSC "high distinction" graduates Amy Post Paysen in Medicine and Joanna R. Evans Grooms in Pharmacy graduated at the top of their respective classes at the University of Nebraska Medical Center.
- Chibawanye Ene was accepted to Indiana University Medical School, Vanderbilt University graduate school, University of Massachusetts graduate school and Penn State University graduate school.
- Cory Lindsay was accepted and is attending the University of Florida, and completed a summer internship in Bermuda at the prestigious Cold Spring Harbor research facility.
- A number of students have been accepted to professional schools and graduate schools at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, the University of Nebraska Medical Center and Creighton University.
