# The Economic Value of Wayne State College

AYNE STATE COLLEGE (WSC) continues to have a significant positive economic impact within the rural communities the College serves and the state as a whole. Additionally, WSC is key in preparing students to enter high demand, high skilled, and high paying careers necessary to continue to grow the economy. Out-of-state students are drawn to the Nebraska, generating new dollars and opportunities for the state. WSC provides students with the education, training, and skills needed to enjoy fulfilling and prosperous careers.

WSC influences both the lives of its students and the state economy. The College supports a variety of businesses and industries in Nebraska and benefits the state by contributing to an expanded economy and improved quality of life for all Nebraskans. The benefits created by WSC extend to the state government through increased tax revenues and public sector savings.


This study measures the economic impacts created by WSC on the business community and the benefits the College generates in return for the investments made by students, taxpayers, and society. The following two analyses are presented:

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### **Economic impact analysis**

### Investment analysis

All results reflect WSC employee, student, and financial data, provided by the College, for fiscal year (FY) 2019-20. Impacts on the Nebraska economy are reported under the economic impact analysis and are measured in terms of added income. The returns on investment to students, taxpayers, and society in Nebraska are reported under the investment analysis.



NEBRASKA

WSC influences both the **lives of its students** and the **state economy**.



WSC promotes economic growth in Nebraska through its direct expenditures and the resulting expenditures of students and state businesses. The College serves as an employer and consumer of goods and services for day-to-day and construction operations. The College's reputation and activities attract students from outside Nebraska, whose expenditures benefit state vendors. In addition, WSC is a primary source of higher education to Nebraska residents and a supplier of educated workers to Nebraska businesses and industries, enhancing overall productivity in the state workforce.

### **Operations spending impact**



WSC adds economic value to Nebraska as an employer and a largescale consumer of goods and services. In FY 2019-20, the College employed 937 full-time and part-time faculty and staff, 96% of whom

lived in Nebraska. Total payroll at WSC was \$30.5 million, much of which was spent in Nebraska for groceries, mortgage and rent payments, dining out, and other household expenses. In addition, the College spent \$22.1 million on dayto-day expenses related to facilities, supplies, and professional services.


WSC's day-to-day operations spending added \$33.2 million in income to Nebraska during the analysis year. This figure represents the College's payroll, the multiplier effects generated by the in-state spending of the College and its employees, and a downward adjustment to account for funding the College received from state sources. The \$33.2 million in added income is equivalent to supporting 958 jobs in Nebraska.

### **Construction Spending Impact**



WSC invests in construction each year to maintain its facilities, create additional capacities, and meet its growing educational demands. While the amount varies from year to year, these quick infusions

of income and jobs have a substantial impact on the Nebraska economy. In FY 2019-20, WSC's construction spending generated \$624,005 in added income for the Nebraska economy, which is equivalent to supporting 10 jobs in the state.



### Student spending impact



Approximately 18% of students attending WSC originated from outside Nebraska in FY 2019-20, with some of these students relocating to Nebraska to attend WSC. Because of its geographic proximity, it

is unlikely these students would have come to Nebraska if the College did not exist. In addition, some in-state students, referred to as retained students, would have left Nebraska if not for the existence of WSC. While attending the College, these relocated and retained students spent money on groceries, accommodation, transportation, and other household expenses. This spending generated \$7.8 million in added income for the Nebraska economy in FY 2019-20, which supported 183 jobs in Nebraska.

### Alumni impact

The educational opportunities provided to the state's residents by WSC has the most significant impact. Since its establishment, students have attended and graduated from WSC, which allowed them to enter the state workforce with the knowledge and skills necessary to meet the evolving workforce needs for Nebraska. Today, thousands of former WSC students are employed in Nebraska. As a result of their WSC educations, the students receive higher earnings and increase the productivity of the businesses that employ them. In FY 2019-20, WSC alumni generated \$223.2 million in added income for the Nebraska economy, which is equivalent to supporting 3,669 jobs.

### **Total impact**

WSC added \$264.8 million in income to the Nebraska economy during the analysis year, equal to the sum of the operations and construction spending impacts, the student spending impact, and the alumni impact.

WSC's total impact can also be expressed in terms of jobs supported. The \$264.8 million impact supported 4,820 Nebraska jobs, using the jobs-to-sales ratios specific to each industry in the state. In addition, the \$264.8 million, or 4,820 supported jobs, stemmed from different industry sectors. Among non-education industry sectors, WSC's spending and alumni in the Arts, Entertainment, & Recreation industry sector supported 324 jobs in FY 2019-20. If the College did not exist, these impacts would not have been generated in Nebraska.

# **INVESTMENT ANALYSIS**



An investment analysis evaluates the costs associated with a proposed venture against its expected benefits. If the benefits outweigh the costs, then the investment is financially worthwhile. The analysis presented here considers WSC as an investment from the perspectives of students, taxpayers, and society in Nebraska.

### **Student perspective**




In FY 2019-20, WSC served 4,884 credit students. As a function of their enrollment at the College, the students paid for tuition, fees, books, and supplies. They also took out loans and will incur interest on those

loans. Additionally, students gave up money they would have otherwise earned had they been working instead of attending college. The total investment made by WSC's students in FY 2019-20 amounted to a present value of \$59.9 million, equal to \$19.3 million in out-of-pocket expenses (including future principal and interest on student loans) and \$40.6 million in forgone time and money.

In return for their investment, WSC's students will receive a stream of higher future earnings that will continue to grow throughout their working lives. For example, the average WSC bachelor's degree graduate from FY 2019-20 will see annual earnings that are \$22,800 higher than a person with a high school diploma or equivalent working in Nebraska. Over a working lifetime, the benefits of the bachelor's degree over a high school diploma will amount to an undiscounted value of \$980,400 in higher earnings per graduate. The present value of the cumulative higher future earnings WSC's FY 2019-20 students will receive over their working careers is \$239.8 million.

The students' benefit-cost ratio is 4.0. In other words, for every dollar students invest in WSC in the form of out-of-pocket expenses and forgone time and money, they will receive a cumulative value of \$4.00 in higher future earnings.

Annually, the students' investment in WSC has an average annual internal rate of return of 15.0%, which is impressive compared to the U.S. stock market's 30-year average rate of return of 10.6%.

### **Taxpayer perspective**



WSC generates more in tax revenue than it takes. These benefits to Nebraska taxpayers consist primarily of taxes the state government will collect from the added revenue created in Nebraska. As WSC students earn more, they will make higher tax payments throughout their work-

ing lives. Students' employers will also make higher tax payments as they increase their output and purchases of goods and services. By the end of the FY 2019-20 students' working lives, Nebraska will have collected a present value of \$32.2 million in added taxes.

Nebraskan taxpayers will also benefit from the savings generated by the improved lifestyles of WSC students and the corresponding reduced need for government services.

Education is statistically correlated with a variety of lifestyle changes. Students' WSC educations will generate savings in three main categories: 1) healthcare, 2) crime, and 3) income assistance. Improved health will lower students' demand for national health care services. In addition, students will be less likely to interact with the criminal justice system, resulting in a reduced demand for law enforcement and lower victim costs. Because WSC students will be more employable, their demand for income assistance such as welfare and unemployment benefits will be reduced. Altogether, the present value of the benefits associated with a WSC education will generate \$8.8 million in savings to Nebraska taxpayers.

Total taxpayer benefits amount to \$41 million, the present value sum of the added taxes and public sector savings. Taxpayer costs are \$23.9 million, equal to the amount of Nebraska state funding WSC received in FY 2019-20. These benefits and costs yield a benefit-cost ratio of 1.7. This means that for every dollar of public money invested in WSC in FY 2019-20, Nebraska taxpayers will receive a cumulative present value of \$1.70 over the course of the students' working lives. The average annual internal rate of return for taxpayers is 3.5%, which compares favorably to other long-term investments in the public and private sectors.

### Social perspective



As a whole, Nebraska benefits from the presence of WSC in two major ways. Primarily, society benefits from an increased economic base in the state. This is attributed to the added income from students'

increased lifetime earnings (added student income) and increased business output (added business income), which raise economic prosperity in Nebraska.

For every dollar of public money invested in WSC, taxpayers will receive a cumulative value of \$1.70 over the course of the students' working lives.

Benefits to society also consist of the savings generated by the improved longterm health and welfare of WSC students. As discussed in the previous section, education is statistically correlated with a variety of lifestyle changes generating social savings. Note these costs are avoided by the consumers but are distinct from the costs avoided by the taxpayers outlined above. Healthcare savings include avoided medical costs associated with smoking, alcohol dependence, obesity, drug abuse, and depression. Justice system savings include avoided costs to the government and society due to less judicial activity. Income assistance savings include reduced welfare and unemployment claims. 
Altogether, the social benefits of WSC equal a present value of \$672 million. These benefits include \$436.1 million in added student income, \$140.5 million in added business income, \$41.6 million in added income from College activities, as well as \$53.9 million in social savings related to health, crime, and income assistance in Nebraska. People in Nebraska invested a present value total of \$102 million in WSC in FY 2019-20. The cost includes all the College and student costs.

The benefit-cost ratio for society is 6.6, equal to the \$672 million in benefits divided by the \$102 million in costs. In other words, for every dollar invested in WSC, people in Nebraska will receive a cumulative value of \$6.60 in benefits. The benefits of this investment will occur for as long as WSC's FY 2019-20 students remain employed in Nebraska.

### Summary of investment analysis results

The results of the analysis demonstrate that WSC is a strong investment for all three major stakeholder groups—students, taxpayers, and society. As shown, students receive a substantial return for their investments in a WSC education. At the same time, taxpayers' investment in WSC returns more to government budgets than it costs and creates a wide range of social benefits throughout Nebraska.

# CONCLUSION

The results of this study demonstrate that WSC continues to have a significant positive economic impact not only on the individual lives of their students, but for Nebraska as a whole. WSC benefits Nebraska businesses by increasing consumer spending in the state and supplying a steady flow of qualified, educated workers to the workforce. WSC enriches the lives of students by raising their lifetime earnings and helping them achieve their individual potential. The College benefits Nebraska taxpayers through increased tax receipts and a reduced demand for government-supported social services. Finally, WSC benefits society as a whole in Nebraska by creating a more prosperous economy and generating a variety of savings through the improved lifestyles of its students.

### About the study

Data and assumptions used in the study are based on several sources, including the FY 2019-20 academic and financial reports from WSC, industry and employment data from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics and U.S. Census Bureau, outputs of Emsi Burning Glass's Multi-Regional Social Accounting Matrix model, and a variety of studies and surveys relating education to social behavior. The study applies a conservative methodology and follows standard practice using only the most recognized indicators of economic impact and investment effectiveness.
