1.1 Approve Authorization for Chancellor to Sign Contract Addendum with FORVIS for Single Audit (FFA)

The System Office requests authorization for the Chancellor to sign a contract addendum with FORVIS to complete the Nebraska State College System Single (federal) Audit.

These audit contracts represent the third year under the Request for Proposal (RFP) process that was completed in advance of the FY20 audit. The contract awarded under the RFP process allowed for annual contracts up to a total of seven (7) years (FY20-FY26). The contract amounts are all within the annual increase of 5% or CPI, whichever is less.

Auditing of the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (CSLFR) as a major program is required because the NSCS received more than \$750,000 in CSLFR Funding and audit of these funds was not included in the original scope of the contract with FORVIS.

The federal audit is funded through College cash funds.

Authorization for the Chancellor to sign the addendum will assure the federal audit continues to move forward in a timely manner once the audit requirements are released.

1.3 Approve Emeritus Status for Dr. Sally Harms (AP)

Dr. Sally Harms, a faculty member from Wayne State College who retired in May 2023, has been nominated for emeritus faculty status upon the four required criteria for granting emeritus status, as outlined below:

- 1. Minimum of 15 years of full time employment is met through 23 years of teaching at Wayne State College.
- 2. She earned the rank of full professor in 2011
- 3. Evidence of exemplary performance in areas of teaching,

scholarship/creative activities, and service is represented as a role model who established high standards for her students, in both her courses and during her supervision of science education candidates. Her service as a mentor to students demonstrates her commitment and dedication to her students. She served on many committees at WSC, such as Rank Tenure and Promotion, Faculty Search Committees, Admission and Retention Committee, and presented at numerous conferences.

4. Demonstrated leadership and collaboration through service and contribution beyond normal expectations is also reflected through her decades of membership in the Nebraska Association of Teachers of Science, her membership and service as President of the Nebraska Academy of Science, and her organization of the Nebraska Junior Academic of Science regional science fair for a number of years.

Chancellor Turman supports the nomination and WSC President Rames provided a letter of support for Dr. Harms' nomination. Both recommend that emeritus faculty status be granted.

Board Policy 4150 is being updated to add the Master of Arts degree as an authorized degree offering for Wayne State College. This degree was approved when the Board approved the offering of a Master of Arts and Master of Science in Interdisciplinary Studies in January 2020, but the policy was not updated at that time.

2.2 Approve The Para to Educator Pathway Partnership Memoranda of Understanding with Millard Public Schools, Bellevue Public Schools and Papillion La Vista Community Schools for Peru State College

Per Board Policy 7015, which requires Board action for approval of all academic agreements, Peru State requests approval of the Para to Educator Pathway Partnership Memoranda of Understanding (MOU) with Millard Public Schools, Bellevue Public Schools and Papillion La Vista Community Schools. This unique pathway initiative is designed

to support paraeducators with an associate degree or significant college coursework as a pathway to earning a Bachelor's degree in education, thus increasing their marketability by adding valuable skill sets to their pedagogical repertoire to serve future students and schools better.

In addition to the Program MOU for each school district, a fourth MOU is included to establish Papillion La Vista as the location for in-person course meetings for the Program.

A motion to approve the Para to Educator Pathway Partnership Memoranda of Understanding with Millard Public Schools, Bellevue Public Schools and Papillion La Vista Community Schools for Peru State College was recommended by the committee to the full Board, which approved the motion. The title to Policy 9009 - Revenue Bonds; Facilities Corporation; Issuance of Bonds; Selection of Financial Advisor; Legal Counsel, Trustee and Underwriter is being changed to Bond Support. The policy format and layout are being updated.

The process used to select the bond team including the Financial

Advisor, Bond Counsel, Bond Trustee, and Bond Underwriter have been clarified in the policy. There are no substantive changes.

4.3 First and Final Round Approval of Revisions to Board Policy 9010; Residence Hall; Operations

The number of Policy 9010 - Residence Hall Operations is being changed to 9400 which is in the series where policies related to residence halls will be found.

The policy is being updated to the new format with some clarifying language changes. The only substantive change is that the level of housing waivers must be approved by the Chancellor. The annual waiver report is part of the Management Report.

4.4 Approve Authorization for Chancellor to Sign High Rise Roofing Contract for Chadron State College

Chadron State College requests authorization for the Chancellor to sign the roofing contract for the High Rise Residence Hall. The existing roof is in poor condition and must be replaced. The eventual contract amount is anticipated to be approximately \$350,000. Authorization for the Chancellor to sign the contract in an amount not to exceed available funding will assure that the replacement of the roof will be installed in a timely manner.

A motion to approve the Authorization for Chancellor to Sign the High Rise Roofing Contract for Chadron State College was recommended by the committee to the full Board, which approved the motion. Voting **AYES**: Chaney, Engles, Peterson, Reynaga, and Terrell.

4.5 Approve Use of Capital Improvement Fee Funds for Indoor Recreation Complex for Peru State College

Peru State College requests approval to use an additional \$300,000 of Capital Improvement Fee (CIF) Funds for construction of Phase A of the Indoor Recreation Complex (IRC) project, also known as Project ROAR (Renewed Opportunities for Activity and Recreation).

At the November 10, 2022 Board meeting, \$73,312.89 in CIF funds were approved for the Indoor Recreation Complex. These funds were the remaining unspent CIF funds originally allocated for the Performing Arts Center Renovation & Addition project, which was completed under budget. With approval of this item and the additional \$300,000 in CIF funds, the total IRC project CIF funds commitment will be \$373,312.89. The additional CIF funds are necessary to start construction on Phase A of the project to help pay for bids; that in total, have come in over the project budget for this phase.

After reserving funds equal to the debt service requirement for FY24, there are sufficient funds available in the Peru State CIF funds account to allocate the additional \$300,000 for this project, leaving a balance of around \$75,000.

A motion to approve the Use of Capital Improvement Fee Funds for the Indoor Recreation Complex for Peru State College was recommended by the committee to the full Board, which approved the motion. Voting **AYES:** Chaney, Engles, Peterson, Reynaga, and Terrell.

5.2 Capital Improvement Fee Account Summary

There have been questions in the past about the Capital Improvement Fee and the related revenues and expenses. To provide the Board with a better understanding of where the money comes from and how it can be used, an annual report will be provided to the Board that shows the balances in each of the accounts (System Office and Colleges), the revenues, and the commitments.

Capital Improvement Fee - Board Policy 6501

Capital Improvement Fee - Revenues generated by this fee are deposited into the State College System Facility Fee Fund (Capital Improvement Fund) and may be used for paying the cost of capital improvement projects approved by the Board of Trustees for facilities at the Colleges or lands owned or controlled by the Board. No Capital Improvement Fee funds shall be expended for capital improvement projects relating to revenue bond facilities and all projects and related budgets must have prior approval of the Board.

Capital Improvement Fee Revenue

The Capital Improvement Fee (CIF) charge per credit hour is approved annually by the Board of Trustees and is the same rate (\$12.00) per credit hour for each College. The CIF is collected on each credit hour produced by the Colleges and deposited into the central fund and tracked by accounts established by the System Office.

Interest on the CIF is deposited into the System Office account.

Capital Improvement Fee Expenses

CIF funds are used first to satisfy debt service requirements that are a part of bonds issued by the Facilities Corporation. We currently have the state matching requirement of \$1,440,000 per year on outstanding bonds. The amount of debt service required is prorated annually among the Colleges. The prorated amount is based on a three-year rolling average of the percentage of CIF revenue collected by each College as a proportion of the total collections of CIF.

The System Office account which receives the interest earnings from all the college CIF balances, is used to pay for administrative expenses such as the Facilities Corporation audit, financial advisor fees, and Facilities Corporation arbitrage calculations.

Once debt service requirements are satisfied, each College may request remaining funds for specific capital projects in line with statutory and policy requirements. Such requests are discussed and reviewed first with the Vice Chancellor for Facilities and Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration. Once reviewed for reasonableness with facilities planning and funding availability, the requests go to the Board of Trustees for approval.

Funds approved by the Board for a specific project shall not be used for any other project. Once a College project is completed that utilized CIF funds, the College may request that any remaining CIF funds be returned to their account and made available for other projects.

Reserves

The Colleges can request the use of any available amounts after debt service requirements for the year have been satisfied and with a reserve requirement equal to the debt service requirement for the coming fiscal year.

Balances remaining the System Office account serves as a buffer and cash flow component in the CIF fund. If the interest balance grows beyond that needed for these purposes, a portion of the funds may be re-distributed to the Colleges. This most recently happened in March of 2023, with a distribution of \$188,000 to the Colleges. When the fund reaches \$1.0M in the future, it will be evaluated again for a potential distribution, or earlier if critical needs arise.

CIF Statement

The CIF account summary is shared with the colleges on a regular basis. The CIF account summary as of June 30, 2023 was attached for reference.

Memorandum of Understanding between The Board of Trustees of the Nebraska State Colleges doing business as Peru State College and MILLARD PUBLIC SCHOOLS

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is designed to create the "Para to Educator Pathway Partnership" between THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE NEBRASKA STATE COLLEGES doing business as PERU STATE COLLEGE (Institution) and MILLARD PUBLIC SCHOOLS (District), collectively (Parties).

WHEREAS, the District employs a significant number of paraeducators who have previous college credits and who wish to pursue a Bachelor's degree in education; and

WHEREAS, the Institution has the expertise and resources to offer a Bachelor's degree program for paraeducators that meets the needs of the District and its paraeducators;

NOW, THEREFORE, the District and the Institution agree as follows:

- 1. The Institution agrees to offer a Bachelor's degree program in K-12 Special Education (hereinafter "Bachelor's degree") specifically for paraeducators who have an Associate's degree or other significant college coursework. The program will be offered in consultation with the District's Superintendent and other select personnel to meet the needs of the District and its paraprofessionals. The program will include online classes and hybrid classes, offered in the Omaha area, as part of a cohort model, outlined in Exhibit 1.
- The Bachelor's degree program will consist of a minimum of 120 (one hundred twenty) credits and will include coursework in education, child development, instructional strategies, and other approved topics. The program will also require fieldwork or internships to provide paraeducators with practical experience in the classroom.
- 3. The Parties agree to work together to promote the Bachelor's degree program to paraeducators in the District who are qualified for the program.
- 4. The District shall nominate paraeducators for the program, with final admissions decisions made by the Institution. The District will be eligible to have up to 7 (seven) students participate in the first cohort. Additional students from the District may be added to the program if space is available.
- 5. The admission requirements for the program will include a minimum of an approved Associate's degree in education or approved significant prior coursework. Students must meet admission requirements for the Teacher Education program, as outlined in Exhibit 2. Students should apply to the Teacher Education Program during their enrollment in EDUC 209 Teacher Education Orientation and Practicum. This course cannot be met through transfer coursework and must be taken through Peru State College.

6. A maximum of 90 ninety) semester credit hours from an accredited four-year college or university and extra-institutional sources may be applied toward the minimum 120 (one hundred twenty) semester hours required for the Bachelor's degree. Of these 90 (ninety) semester hours, a maximum of 66 (sixty-six) semester credit hours may be earned from a community/ vocational/ technical college or other extra-institutional sources. Transfer courses must have a grade of C- or higher in order to transfer to the Institution for the Bachelor's degree.

- 7. An Associate of Arts (AA) or Associate of Science (AS) degree completed at an accredited postsecondary institution that includes a minimum of 30 (thirty) semester hours of general studies coursework or its equivalent will fulfill requirements for the General Studies program.
- 8. To continue in the Bachelor's degree program, students must meet the current standards as outlined in the School of Education Teacher Handbook. Once an applicant is admitted into the Teacher Education Program, they are expected to remain continuously enrolled in the cohort classes and maintain academic eligibility. Should an applicant fail to remain consistently enrolled in the Teacher Education Program and defer taking courses for more than one semester, they will be required to meet the current requirements of the program. In addition, if the required cumulative GPA falls below 2.75 after being admitted to the Teacher Education Program, the Teacher Candidate will be removed from the program and will be required to re-apply once the required cumulative GPA is 2.75 or above.
- The Institution will ensure that the Bachelor's degree program is accredited by relevant accrediting agencies and meets all necessary state of Nebraska standards and requirements for Bachelor's degree programs.
- 10. The Institution may seek to employ qualified adjunct instructors from each of the Districts participating in the program. Full-time faculty from the Peru State campus will also teach in the program.
- 11. The District may provide financial support to paraprofessionals enrolled in the program, including tuition reimbursement and other financial assistance as determined by the District. The Institution may provide scholarships to qualifying students. The Parties agree to work collaboratively to pursue grants to defray costs to the students. Tuition will be the current rates at the Institution for campus and online courses.
- 12. Term and Termination of MOU. The term of the MOU shall be effective on July 15, 2023 until June 30, 2027. The MOU may be terminated by either party prior to this date by written notification signed by the appropriate official of the Party initiating the termination. Such notification must be received by the other Party at least 6 (six) months prior to the effective termination date.
- 13. Amendment of MOU. This MOU may be amended at any time by the written agreement of both Parties. Any amendments to this MOU shall be in writing and approved in the same manner as was used to approve this MOU.

14. Indemnification. To the maximum extent permitted by law, each Party agrees to indemnify and defend the other Party against, and to hold it harmless from, all claims, suits, liability, expense or damage (including reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs) for damage to property, injury to persons (including death) and any other claims, suits, or liability resulting from the negligence of such party or any of its employees or agents; provided however, the indemnification under this provision shall not apply if such claims, suits, liability, expense or damage is the direct result of the willful misconduct or gross negligence of either Party. In no event shall either party be liable for any punitive, consequential, or special damages or lost profits incurred or alleged to have been incurred.

- 15. Both Parties affirm that they will comply with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) for sharing student information.
- 16. This MOU sets forth the entire agreement of the Parties and supersedes all previous agreements, prior negotiations, discussions and proposals.

Exhibit 2: Teacher Education Admission Requirements

Admission to the Teacher Education Program does not equate to admission to Peru State College. To initiate the process of admission into the Teacher Education Program, the candidate is required to file a formal application as part of EDUC 209 Teacher Education Orientation and Practicum and meet all necessary admission criteria and conditions as listed below. The Teacher Education Committee reviews each candidate's application to determine eligibility for admission into teacher education. Candidates are notified via email when they have been fully admitted by the Teacher Education Committee that meets on a regular basis during the Fall and Spring semesters.

Admissions criteria and conditions—prior to review for admission by the Teacher Education Committee the applicant must fulfill the following requirements:

- 1. Have fewer than two Educator Disposition Assessment (EDA) notices on file in the School of Education. If the applicant has two or more dispositions, a formal meeting of the full SOEARC will be called to discuss considerations to be recommended to the Dean upon admittance. (See Termination for Teacher Education Program Policy)
- 2. Possess an overall grade point average (GPA) of at least 2.75 with at least 42 credits completed. A minimum cumulative overall GPA of 2.75 must be maintained to remain in the Teacher Education Program once admitted.
- 3. Possess minimum scores on the Praxis Core Academic Skills for Educators exam as indicated below. Reading 156 Math 150 Writing 162
- 4. Successfully complete faculty panel interviews during the semester of enrollment in EDUC 209 Teacher Education Orientation and Practicum.
- 5. Complete the 'Educator Disposition Assessment Acknowledgement and Agreement' form. (via LiveText in the EDUC 209)
- 6. Successfully complete pre-requisite course work (grade of C or above) that include:
 - EDUC 208 Foundation of Principles of Teacher Education
 - EDUC 209 Teacher Education Orientation and Practicum
 - EDUC 255 Differentiated Instruction for Diverse Learners
 - SPED 200 Introduction to Special Education
 - PSYC 250 Human Growth and Development
- 7. Provide evidence of proficiency in English Composition and Mathematics as indicated by a grade of C or above in college level courses or minimum scores of 26 on the English and Mathematics sections of the ACT or 800 on the SAT.
- 8. Complete a Background Check through OneSource and meet requirements as stated in Nebraska Department of Education Rule 20 and 21.
- 9. Complete a Personal and Professional Fitness Statement and meet requirements as stated in Nebraska Department of Education Rule 20 and 21.

The program will include online classes and hybrid classes, offered in the Omaha area, as part of a cohort model, outlined in Exhibit 1.
- The Bachelor's degree program will consist of a minimum of 120 (one hundred twenty) credits and will include coursework in education, child development, instructional strategies, and other relevant topics. The program will also require fieldwork or internships to provide paraeducators with practical experience in the classroom.
- 3. The Parties agree to work together to promote the Bachelor's degree program to paraeducators in the District who are qualified for the program.
- 4. The District shall nominate paraeducators for the program, with final admissions decisions made by the Institution. The District will be eligible to have up to 7 (seven) students participate in the first cohort. Additional students from the District may be added if space is available.
- 5. The admission requirements for the program will include a minimum of an approved Associate's degree in education or approved significant prior coursework. Students must meet admission requirements for the Teacher Education program, as outlined in Exhibit 2. Students should apply to the Teacher Education Program during their enrollment in EDUC 209 Teacher Education Orientation and Practicum. This course cannot be met through transfer coursework and must be taken through Peru State College.

6. A maximum of 90 (ninety) semester credit hours from an accredited four-year college or university and extra-institutional sources may be applied toward the minimum 120 (one hundred twenty) semester hours required for a Bachelor's degree. Of these 90 (ninety) semester hours, a maximum of 66 (sixty-six) semester credit hours may be from a community/ vocational/ technical college or other extra-institutional sources. Transfer courses must have a grade of C- or higher in order to transfer to the Institution.

- 7. An Associate of Arts (AA) or Associate of Science (AS) degree completed at an accredited postsecondary institution that includes a minimum of 30 (thirty) semester hours of general studies coursework or its equivalent will fulfill requirements for the General Studies program.
- 8. To continue in the Bachelor's degree program, students must meet the current standards as outlined in the School of Education Teacher Handbook. Once an applicant is admitted to the Teacher Education Program, they are expected to remain continuously enrolled in the cohort classes and maintain eligibility. Should an applicant fail to remain consistently enrolled in the Teacher Education Program and defer taking courses for more than one semester, they will be required to meet the current requirements of the program. In addition, if the required cumulative GPA falls below 2.75 after being admitted to the Teacher Education Program, the Teacher Candidate will be removed from the program and will be required to re-apply once the required cumulative GPA is 2.75 or above.
- The Institution will ensure that the Bachelor's degree program is accredited by relevant accrediting agencies and meets all necessary state of Nebraska standards and requirements for Bachelor's degree programs.
- 10. The Institution will seek to employ qualified adjunct instructors from each of the Districts participating in the program. Full-time faculty from the Peru State campus will also teach in the program.
- 11. The District may provide financial support to paraprofessionals enrolled in the program, including tuition reimbursement and other financial assistance as determined by the District. The Institution may provide scholarships to qualifying students. The Parties agree to work collaboratively to pursue grants to defray costs to the students. Tuition will be the current rates at the Institution for campus and online courses.
- 12. Term and Termination of MOU. The term of the MOU shall be effective on July 15, 2023 until June 30, 2027. The MOU may be terminated by either party prior to this date by written notification signed by the appropriate official of the Party initiating the termination. Such notification must be received by the other Party at least 6 (six) months prior to the effective termination date.
- 13. Amendment of MOU. This MOU may be amended at any time by the written agreement of both Parties. Any amendments to this MOU shall be in writing and approved in the same manner as was used to approve this Agreement.

14. Indemnification. To the maximum extent permitted by law, each Party agrees to indemnify and defend the other Party against, and to hold it harmless from, all claims, suits, liability, expense or damage (including reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs) for damage to property, injury to persons (including death) and any other claims, suits, or liability resulting from the negligence of such party or any of its employees or agents; provided however, the indemnification under this Section IV. C. shall not apply if such claims, suits, liability, expense or damage is the direct result of the willful misconduct or gross negligence of either Party. In no event shall either party be liable for any punitive, consequential, or special damages or lost profits incurred or alleged to have been incurred.

- 15. Both Parties affirm that they will comply with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) for sharing student information.
- 16. This MOU sets forth the entire agreement of the Parties and supersedes all previous agreements, prior negotiations, discussions and proposals.

Exhibit 2: Teacher Education Admission Requirements

Admission to the Teacher Education Program does not equate to admission to Peru State College. To initiate the process of admission into the Teacher Education Program, the candidate is required to file a formal application as part of EDUC 209 Teacher Education Orientation and Practicum and meet all necessary admission criteria and conditions as listed below. The Teacher Education Committee reviews each candidate's application to determine eligibility for admission into teacher education. Candidates are notified via email when they have been fully admitted by the Teacher Education Committee that meets on a regular basis during the Fall and Spring semesters.

Admissions criteria and conditions—prior to review for admission by the Teacher Education Committee the applicant must fulfill the following requirements:

- 1. Have fewer than two Educator Disposition Assessment (EDA) notices on file in the School of Education. If the applicant has two or more dispositions, a formal meeting of the full SOEARC will be called to discuss considerations to be recommended to the Dean upon admittance. (See Termination for Teacher Education Program Policy)
- 2. Possess an overall grade point average (GPA) of at least 2.75 with at least 42 credits completed. A minimum cumulative overall GPA of 2.75 must be maintained to remain in the Teacher Education Program once admitted.
- 3. Possess minimum scores on the Praxis Core Academic Skills for Educators exam as indicated below. Reading 156 Math 150 Writing 162
- 4. Successfully complete faculty panel interviews during the semester of enrollment in EDUC 209 Teacher Education Orientation and Practicum.

Memorandum of Understanding between The Board of Trustees of the Nebraska State Colleges doing business as Peru State College and PAPILLION LA VISTA COMMUNITY SCHOOLS

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is established between THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE NEBRASKA STATE COLLEGES doing business as PERU STATE COLLEGE (Institution) and PAPILLION LA VISTA COMMUNITY SCHOOLS (District).

Terms

The Parties agree to collaborate in facilitating the K-12 Special Education Para to Educator Pathway Program (Program) and to provide for the participation of 2 (two) Papillion La Vista Community Schools' qualified employees in the Program.

This MOU shall be effective on July 15, 2023 until June 30, 2027.

Responsibilities

The District shall be responsible for providing instructional space for the Program courses and providing an appropriate environment for the Program located at Liberty Middle School on 10820 Witmuss Drive, Papillion NE. The District shall be responsible for providing the following as part of the MOU:

- 1. Classroom space for instructional activities for Program participants from Millard Public Schools, Bellevue Public Schools, and Papillion La Vista Community Schools.
- 2. Custodial staff who will clean the facility.
- 3. Utilities for the Program hours of operation.
- 4. Wireless internet necessary for instruction and learning.

In consideration of the responsibilities and resources provided by the District pursuant to this MOU, the Institution agrees to provide 2 (two) Career Scholarships for the participation of 2 (two) qualified District employees in the Program per academic year. Such individuals must:

- 1. Be accepted into the Institution's Para to Teacher Pathway program.
- 2. Maintain a GPA in accordance with the Institution's standard.
- 3. Remain in good academic standing with the Institution.

The cost of the participation of these students shall not exceed the equivalent credit costs established by the Institution.

Termination

- __the revenues of the facilities to be paid to the Bond Trustee for deposit in the revenue fund;
- e) the amount to be paid to the Bond Trustee for deposit in the Debt Service Fund; and, and
- 1) the amount of anticipated Surplus and related coverage ratio.

1.1. Minimum Reserve Requirements

When establishing the fiscal year's operating budget, <u>T</u>the requirements regarding minimum amounts to be on deposit in the bond accounts, as specified in the <u>eC</u>olleges' bond resolutions, shall be <u>confirmed by the System Office and taken into account when establishing the fiscal year's operating budget.</u>

1.2. Revised Operating Budgets

Any eCollege may submit, if needed, revisions to its <u>Auxiliary System</u> revenue bond operating budget. Any revision shall not become effective until the Board has approved the revision and the same has been delivered to the Bond Trustee.

- Selection The Fiscal, Facilities and Audit Committee, along with the Chancellor and Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration, may conduct an RFP or informal process to select a Financial Advisor. If an informal process is used, the Committee shall interview at least three (3) qualified firms before making a recommendation regarding an engagement to with the Board.
- Term The initial contract term shall be a one-year period and can be extended by written agreement of the parties until the Fiscal, Facilities and Audit Committee, along with the Chancellor and Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration, determine that it is in the Board's best interest to conduct another RFP or informal selection process.

When bonds are to be issued to benefit the State College System, tThe Board of Trustees shall designate a legal firm to represent it, draft the required bond documents, provide advice to the Board on the legal structure and related legal matters, and deliver such opinions to the Board appropriate for such bond issue.

- Selection The Fiscal, Facilities and Audit Committee, along with the Chancellor and Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration may conduct an RFP or informal process to select a legal firm. If an informal process is used, the Committee shall interview at least three (3) qualified firms before making a recommendation regarding the designation to the Board.
- Term Once the selection is made for bond counsel, the firm can be used on subsequent bond deals until such time that it is deemed appropriate by the Fiscal, Facilities and Audit Committee, along with the Chancellor and Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration, that it is in the Board's best interest to conduct another RFP or informal selection process.

1.3. Bond Trustee

When a new resolution is to be approved, the Board shall designate a Trustee to act on behalf of the bond holders affiliated with that particular indenture. When bonds are issued under supplemental resolutions, the appointment of the firm selected as Trustee under the original resolution is expected to be extended.

<u>Selection</u> – The Fiscal, Facilities and Audit Committee, along with the Chancellor and Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration, may conduct an informal process to select a Trustee. If an informal process is used, the Committee shall interview at least three (3) qualified firms before making a recommendation regarding the designation to the Board.

1.4. Bond Underwriter

When bonds are to be issued, the Board, or its Financial Advisor on behalf of the Board, may solicit proposals from firms to provide underwriting services. One or more underwriting firms may be selected that are determined to best meet the goals of the Board related to a particular bond issue.

 <u>Selection -</u> The Chancellor, in consultation with the Fiscal, Facilities and Audit Committee, is delegated the authority to select the underwriting firm(s) for each bond issue.

1.1. President's Direction Heading 2

Each campus President shall have responsibility for the development and application of policies relating to the operation of campus student housing and any other residence units which operate as approved State-College housing. The objectives of such policies include the following:

- Affordability of housing subject to the approval of all rates by the Board the maintenance of reasonable rates for room and board charges, subject to the approval of the Board, and shall
- Einsure maximum occupancy and/or an adequate flow of revenue to support the operations of the residential systemose revenue bond facilities.
- Provide necessary funding to maintain the facilities.
- The safety of students in recognized State College housing is of paramount importance; operation of State College housing will provide a safe and secure environment for student residents

- Provide sion should be made for the imposition of sanctions on students who violate campus policy in regard to student housing.

2. Housing Waivers

The President is authorized to provide <u>limited</u> waivers to students for residence hall contracts <u>with the maximum cap approved by the Chancellor.</u> The waivers are beyond those provided to resident assistants and are calculated as a percentage of total revenue. and shall submit an annual report to the Board of Trustees in April in the format established by the System Office. A report on residence hall waivers will be provided to the Board of Trustee members annually.

Peru State College requests approval to use an additional \$300,000 of Capital Improvement Fee (CIF) Funds for construction of Phase A of the Indoor Recreation Complex (IRC) project, also known as Project ROAR (Renewed Opportunities for Activity and Recreation).

At the November 10, 2022 Board meeting, \$73,312.89 in CIF funds were approved for the Indoor Recreation Complex. These funds were the remaining unspent CIF funds originally allocated for the Performing Arts Center Renovation & Addition project, which was completed under budget. With approval of this item and the additional \$300,000 in CIF funds, the total IRC project CIF funds commitment will be \$373,312.89. The additional CIF funds are necessary to start construction on Phase A of the project to help pay for bids; that in total, have come in over the project budget for this phase.

After reserving funds equal to the debt service requirement for FY24, there are sufficient funds available in the Peru State CIF funds account to allocate the additional \$300,000 for this project, leaving a balance of around \$75,000.

INFORMATION ONLY: Capital Improvement Fee Account Summary

There have been questions in the past about the Capital Improvement Fee and the related revenues and expenses. To provide the Board with a better understanding of where the money comes from and how it can be used, an annual report will be provided to the Board that shows the balances in each of the accounts (System Office and Colleges), the revenues, and the commitments.

Capital Improvement Fee - Board Policy 6501

Capital Improvement Fee - Revenues generated by this fee are deposited into the State College System Facility Fee Fund (Capital Improvement Fund) and may be used for paying the cost of capital improvement projects approved by the Board of Trustees for facilities at the Colleges or lands owned or controlled by the Board. No Capital Improvement Fee funds shall be expended for capital improvement projects relating to revenue bond facilities and all projects and related budgets must have prior approval of the Board.

Capital Improvement Fee Revenue

The Capital Improvement Fee (CIF) charge per credit hour is approved annually by the Board of Trustees and is the same rate (\$12.00) per credit hour for each College. The CIF is collected on each credit hour produced by the Colleges and deposited into the central fund and tracked by accounts established by the System Office.

Interest on the CIF is deposited into the System Office account.

Capital Improvement Fee Expenses

CIF funds are used first to satisfy debt service requirements that are a part of bonds issued by the Facilities Corporation. We currently have the state matching requirement of \$1,440,000 per year on outstanding bonds. The amount of debt service required is prorated annually among the Colleges. The prorated amount is based on a three-year rolling average of the percentage of CIF revenue collected by each College as a proportion of the total collections of CIF.

The System Office account which receives the interest earnings from all the college CIF balances, is used to pay for administrative expenses such as the Facilities Corporation audit, financial advisor fees, and Facilities Corporation arbitrage calculations.

Once debt service requirements are satisfied, each College may request remaining funds

for specific capital projects in line with statutory and policy requirements. Such requests are discussed and reviewed first with the Vice Chancellor for Facilities and Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration. Once reviewed for reasonableness with facilities planning and funding availability, the requests go to the Board of Trustees for approval.

Funds approved by the Board for a specific project shall not be used for any other project. Once a College project is completed that utilized CIF funds, the College may request that any remaining CIF funds be returned to their account and made available for other projects.

Reserves

The Colleges can request the use of any available amounts after debt service requirements for the year have been satisfied and with a reserve requirement equal to the debt service requirement for the coming fiscal year.

Balances remaining the System Office account serves as a buffer and cash flow component in the CIF fund. If the interest balance grows beyond that needed for these purposes, a portion of the funds may be re-distributed to the Colleges. This most recently happened in March of 2023, with a distribution of \$188,000 to the Colleges. When the fund reaches \$1.0M in the future, it will be evaluated again for a potential distribution, or earlier if critical needs arise.

CIF Statement

The CIF account summary is shared with the colleges on a regular basis. The CIF account summary as of June 30, 2023 is attached for reference.
